Practical Wisdom

- The center-piece of all virtues
- Capacity that allows us to act well given the nature of the situation
- Aristotle- if you have PW, you have all the virtues
- We all have some practical wisdom- we got through things

- Alice in Wonderland example- if you don't have goals, it doesn't matter what you do

Goodness, Virtue, and Wisdom

- Human flourishing- you'll flourish if you are virtuous; virtues are strengths we have that make it possible to flourish
- Characteristically human goods
 - Meaning
 - Purpose
 - Belonging
 - Beauty
 - Justice
- These goods are what we are made to do

Context in deciding how to act

Important b/c we have to figure out how to apply the rules/principles we live by

Goods and Character Strengths in Context

- Goods and character strengths
- Goods in context
 - Social and historical context- ex. knowledge used to have different value many years ago (we used to value black-smith knowledge, etc more); helps us to interpret what is good; people around the world have different views of justice
 - What is universal is that all humans NEED characteristically human goods
 - Immediate context
- Character strengths in context
 - See chart about situations and strengths (i.e. risk requires courage)

The Golden Mean Revisited (GM=virtue)

- Virtue as a mean- but not exactly in middle of deficiency and excess
- The context defines the mean
 - Ex. diamond necklace on the third date- generosity
- The key is to act fittingly and nobly

Practical Wisdom Components (they always go together)

- **Moral perception**
 - How do we recognize the situation we are in?
 - Situations do not come pre-labeled
 - Moral perception- we want to develop it so we can identify what is important/central
 - How do we know what is most important?
 - Intuitive grasp of what situations are about- very natural
 - Our socialization- ex. years of school taught us how to be in class
 - Our emotions- ex. sadness is an empathic response, anger tells us there is an injustice going on
 - Our grasp of basic human concerns
 - Our specific goals- how we want things to go determines how we act
 - Our ability to listen to others- what other ppl tell or show us
 - There is no algorithm for life!- Aristotle says there are no set rules, just guidelines
 - Query the situation
 - What is most important right now?
 - How do I feel about this situation?
 - What is most central at this moment?
 - What is at stake for me, group, others?
 - How do others' actions make sense?
 - What goals am I (are we) trying to achieve?
 - What would be the best outcome I can hope for?
- **Deliberation**
 - Often the appropriate action is obvious
 - General rules are helpful but particulars trump- ultimate reasons are the particulars of the situation
 - Appropriateness and nobility are key factors- helps us bring about most good
 - With the goal in mind, what is possible right now to pursue the goal?
 - Reflect on how an action is likely to play out
 - All things considered
 - Thrasybulus
- **Reasoned choice**
 - Prohairesis (Aristotle's word- don't need to know)- choosing over or choosing before
 - We want to make these choices well- we should choose the best things and have good reason for it
 - Keen sense of the possible- line and dot puzzle
 - Timing
 - Flexibility
 - Self-reflect on your actions- humans can evaluate what we have done, if things don't go well this is how we fix things

Practical Wisdom

- The ability to recognize what is most important in present circumstances (moral perception)
 - in relation to important goals (MP)
 - so we can choose an action (reasoned choice)
 - that is appropriate to the circumstances (del)
 - and helps to attain the goals (deliberation)
 - all things considered (MP and deliberation)
- Contrast with cleverness- bestial people can be clever but not show PW; cleverness- you can get what you want but it might not be the good thing to do- pursue the good!
- Contrast with "cosmic" wisdom- knowing about what is important for eternity, the soul, etc; we are focusing on THIS world with practical wisdom
- Differs from "situational ethics"- the situation guides us but there is no over-arching good that guides us (in SE), in PW we are searching for the good to follow in the situation
- Sometimes we question our desires and goals
- Humans make judgments about our judgments
- Second order evaluation

Knowing how to do the right thing at the right time for the right reason toward the right people and in the right way

 - More experienced
 - Our heroes
- Most of our actions require coordination with others
- Individual good always linked to shared good
